THE 9/11 COMMISSION REPORT: THE UNFINISHED AGENDA

Timothy J. Roemer, Moderator



Timothy J. Roemer, a member of the board of the 9/11 Public Discourse Project, is a former member of the National Commission on Terrorist Attacks Upon the United States (9/11 Commission). From 1991-2003, Roemer represented the Third District of Indiana in the U.S. House of Representatives, where he served on the Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence. Roemer served on the bipartisan Congressional Joint Inquiry which issued a report on the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001, and was the key author of the legislation in the House to establish the 9/11 Commission.

The Hon. Sam Nunn

Senator Sam Nunn is co-chairman and chief executive officer of the Nuclear Threat Initiative (NTI), a nonprofit organization working to reduce the global threat from nuclear, biological and chemical weapons. He served as a United States Senator from Georgia from 1972-1996. During his tenure in the Senate, Senator Nunn served as chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee. Among his legislative achievements is the "Nunn-Lugar" Cooperative Threat Reduction Program, which provides assistance to Russia and the former Soviet republics to secure and destroy their excess nuclear, biological and chemical weapons, delivery systems, and nuclear material.

Steven Brill

Steven Brill is the Founder and Chairman of the America Prepared Campaign, a nonpartisan, nonprofit campaign to encourage Americans prepare for a terrorist attack and other emergencies. Brill is the author of *After: How America Confronted the September 12 Era*.

Dr. Ashton Carter

Dr. Ashton Carter is Co-Director (with former Secretary of Defense William J. Perry) of the Preventive Defense Project, a research collaboration of Harvard's Kennedy School of Government and Stanford University. Dr. Carter served as Assistant Secretary of Defense for International Security Policy during President Clinton's first term, where he was responsible for countering weapons of mass destruction worldwide, oversight of the U.S. nuclear arsenal and missile defense programs, policy regarding the collapse of the former Soviet Union (including its nuclear weapons and other weapons of mass destruction), and chairmanship of NATO's High Level Group.

Leonard S. Spector

Leonard Spector is Deputy Director of the Center for Nonproliferation Studies at the Monterey Institute of International Studies. From September 1997 to January 2001, Mr. Spector served as Deputy Assistant Secretary for Arms Control and Nonproliferation at the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE). His wide-ranging portfolio included DOE's Initiatives for Proliferation Prevention and Nuclear Cities Initiative

programs, which seek to provide non-defense job opportunities for former Soviet weapon-of-mass-destruction scientists.

Juliette Kayyem

Juliette Kayyem is Acting Executive Director for Research of the Belfer Center for Science and International Affairs, at the John F. Kennedy School of Government. Ms. Kayyem has an extensive background in terrorism and national security affairs. From 1999-2000, she served as former House Minority Leader Richard Gephardt's appointee to the National Commission on Terrorism (chaired by L. Paul Bremer), a congressionally-mandated review of how the government could better prepare for the growing terrorist threat.
